
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Huairou Commission

- Continually building and deepening democracy by facilitating partnerships between grassroots women, governments and with local government.

- Undertake formal roles which will change their status in the community women
- Enable women to manage and use multi-purpose safe spaces
- Access to information, public funds/ budgets
- Improved access to services
- Building a culture of peace and security



How will partnerships with grassroots benefit local governments?

- Compel women to organize towards collective interests and act as a united constituency
- Access information about communities
- Disseminate information about programs, budgets and other opportunities
- Effective, responsive and efficient programming, delivery of services to poor communities.
